Introduction

The Friends of the Burlington Northern Railroad (FOBNR) historical society was chartered in 1993 to gather, preserve, and share information about the history and the current operations of the Burlington Northern Railroad. In 1996 following the merger between Burlington Northern and Santa Fe, the group voted to follow the Burlington Northern from 1970 to 1995 and the BNSF from 1995 to the present. The Group's quarterly publication, The BN Expediter, is the voice of the organization that shares news about the group's activities, BN historical data, and current operations of the railroad. The society also has an annual convention at some location on the BNSF system with programs, tours, displays, a banquet with a keynote speaker, lots of railfanning, and a business meeting.

HISTORY OF THE ROUNDHOUSE

he Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad Roundhouse and attached backshop complex are among the oldest railroad shop buildings in the United States. Built between 1855 and 1866, the complex is of pre-eminent national significance in American transportation history.

It began with a meeting of business men from Aurora and Batavia in late 1848 that led to the issuing of a state charter for the Aurora Branch Railroad on February 12, 1849. Twelve



Such growth demanded appropriate repair shops and terminal facilities, thus construction on the roundhouse complex began in 1855. Designed by Levi Waterhouse and built by J. R. Coulter Builders under the supervision of C. F. Allen, architect, the structure cost \$150,000.00.

Throughout the years, the complex was expanded and improved upon utilizing Fox River limestone from Batavia and a local quarry. The three sections of the existing roundhouse were constructed in 1855, 1859, and 1866 respectively. The first section housed twenty-two stalls, the second added eight, and the third had ten stalls, combining to become the "erecting shops" where engines were built and repaired from the late 1860's to the

shops" where engines were built and repaired from the late 1860's to the 1920's. The three sections were built in semi-circular fashion to form a complete circle. This was done to accommodate the turntable, situated in the center. The Iccomotives entered through the large portal at the south end of the roundhouse onto the turntable in this manner, they could be "steered" into the appro-



priate stall for inspection or repairs. Also noteworthy are the iron Fink roof trusses which are supported by both the exterior and interior circular walls and date back to 1878.



Machine Shop A was where the major repairs and construction activities took place during the first decades of operation. Erected in 1856 as a two-story building, a fire in 1863 destroyed the second story walls leaving behind the one-story structure you see today.

Machine Shop B was constructed in 1863 as a connecting building between the roundhouse and Machine Shop A It served as the principal erecting shop until activities were moved into the roundhouse

At its peak, the complete roundhouse complex boasted almost two thousand employees and seventy acres of land serving more than 13.00 miles of track. During the twentieth century, changes from construction and repair of steam locomotives to the construction of streamlined passenger cars paralleted developments throughout the railroad industry. Shop operations were discontinued in 1974.


















